My words turn to follow the ancient ridgelines along the southern boundary, dropping down into Mercer and Te Pou o Mangatāwhiri. My greetings reach you at Kaiaua who gazes across Tīkapa Moana to the sacred mountain, Moehau. Taking to the sea, my remarks travel to Maraetai and then to Ōhuiarangi, sentinel to Pakuranga. There we follow again the Tāmaki River to Te Puke o Taramainuku, Ōtara resides there. From here I reach for Manurewa until my greetings come to rest

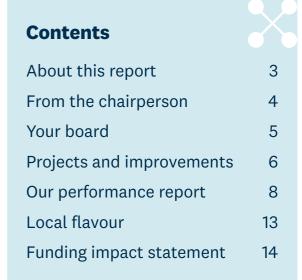

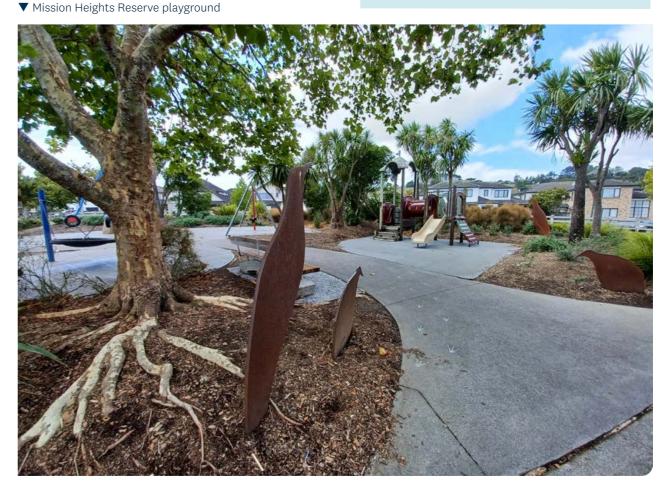
About this report

From the chairperson

Tēnā koutou,

As we close out the first year of the new Howick Local Board Plan 2023, we're pleased to report good progress.

Our ongoing support for UXBRIDGE and Howick Historical Village has enabled them to build on their continued successes with increased visitors and programming. Together with our Arts Out East brokering programme, we're enabling more arts and culture opportunities.

Our environmental action continues to deliver amazing results. Pest Free Howick's Moth Plant Competition once again broke records with approximately six billion seeds removed. While our industrial pollution prevention programme will pause for a year while we assess its impact, our construction waste education and enforcement programme continues, supported by innovation to prevent illegal dumping. Meanwhile, our support for EnviroSchools continues to empower students and develop the next generation of leaders.

With nearly a third of our population under the age of 25, we're investing more to support our tamariki (children) and rangatahi (youth). Our decision to keep the Early Childhood Education Centre at Howick Leisure Centre has enabled us to reinvest into Te Taiwhanga Taiohi East Auckland Youth Space. Opened in April 2024, the dedicated youth space has exceeded expectations with over 23,000 visits in its first year. Together with our ongoing support for the Howick Youth Council, we remain committed to empowering youth and responding to their needs.

Moving into next year, we remain focused on addressing service gaps, particularly for Flat Bush. We're pleased to have secured funding for the long-awaited Flat Bush Community Centre and Library, and Pool and Leisure Centre. In the meantime, we've funded a temporary library within the Ormiston town centre that will provide space for our communities to connect and grow.

Delivering more with less has taken focus, discipline, and lots of hard work. I'm pleased to report that staff and members have risen to the challenge and our community will benefit from the combined efforts of many. Ehara taku toa i te toa takitahi, engari he toa takitini - our strength is not made from us alone but made from many.

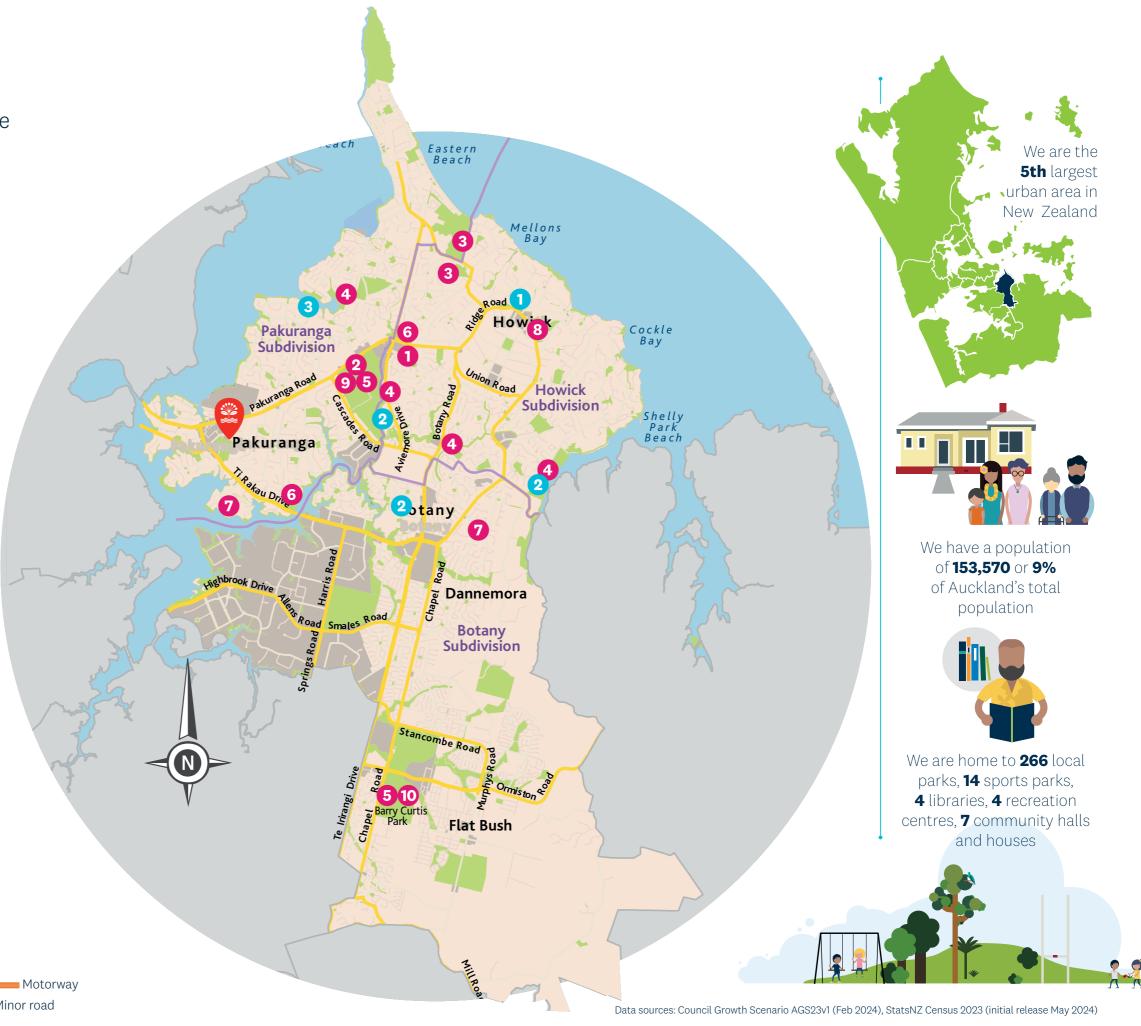

Local Community Services

We supported strong, diverse, and vibrant communities through libraries and literacy, arts and culture, parks, sport and recreation, and events delivered by a mix of council services, community group partnerships and volunteers. We empowered community groups to deliver local initiatives through contestable grants, partnerships and collaboration.

We continued supporting Te Taiwhanga Taiohi - East Auckland Youth Space, delivering youth-focused programmes shaped by the needs of local young people.

Ongoing renewal and maintenance of assets including playgrounds, pathways and toilet block refurbishment remained a key focus.

Percentage of local open space asset components that are not in poor or very poor condition²

12.7 per cent of assets are currently rated as poor, and 2 per cent as very poor. While most poor-condition assets have been renewed, a significant proportion of land fixture assets - such as bins, fitness equipment, drinking fountains and seating - have deteriorated from average to poor or very poor condition. These will form part of our renewals planning.

Local flavour

Exploring local Howick Enviroschools

Howick Local Board members recently visited four local Enviroschools to see how students and staff are leading the way in sustainability.

The visits gave board members a firsthand look at the creative, hands-on initiatives supported by the Enviroschools programme - a nationwide initiative that empowers tamariki (children) and rangatahi (youth) to take action for a sustainable future.

The Howick Local Board provided \$36,000 in funding for the Enviroschools programme in 2024/2025, supporting environmental education and sustainability initiatives. This commitment will increase to \$38,000 in 2025/2026, reflecting the board's continued support for youth-led environmental action.

The board toured Pakuranga Baptist Enviro-Kindergarten, Our Lady Star of the Sea School, Mission Heights Junior College, and Mission Heights Primary. They were joined by new Enviroschools principals and teachers, alongside the Sustainable Schools team.

At Pakuranga Baptist Enviro-Kindergarten, children are actively learning to care for Papatūānuku (earth) through activities like composting, 3D mapping, bee watering stations, and planting trips to Ohuiārangi / Pigeon Mountain. This immersive, real-world learning is exactly what the Enviroschools kaupapa aims to deliver.

"These visits show the long-term impact of

Howick Local Board's support," says Sustainable Schools Advisor Cate Jessep. "We're seeing over 1,000 students engaged in the Pest Free Howick programme, 40 schools reducing waste by up to 74 per cent, and a growing number of schools running initiatives like Garden to Table, carbon footprint tracking, and the Moth Plant competition. Four new schools joined this year, bringing the total to 33 of 44 schools in the area."

Enviroschools is a key part of the board's To Tātou Taiao/Our Environment commitment, which also includes native planting for birds, iwi-led restoration of Te Naupata / Musick Point, and education-focused programmes across the region.

The board's investment is helping to grow a generation of environmentally conscious leaders, many of whom go on to champion sustainability in their careers and communities.

Enviroschools, supported by Toimata Foundation and regional partners, encourages students to explore, design, and take action in their local environments. In Auckland, 343 centres and schools are on this journey, contributing to healthier ecosystems, reduced waste, stronger community connections, and vibrant learning environments.

Variance explanation Actual 2024/2025 to Annual Plan 2024/2025

- 1. We spent more than expected on staff and utilities. This was mainly because of wage increases to support the living wage and higher costs for things like electricity, gas, and water due to rising market prices. One of the affected sites was Lloyd Elsmore Pool and Leisure Centre operated by the council.
- 2. Although we spent less than planned on some capital projects, the over-spend on staff and suppliers was higher, which required an increase in borrowings. These increases to staff and suppliers and borrowings have been offset by reductions in other local boards and Group of Activities.
- 3. We spent less than planned on some major projects because they depend on detailed planning and approvals. For example, replacing the play equipment at Barry Curtis Park has taken longer due to consent and community consultation, and is now expected to finish in 2025/2026. Work on renewing the Lloyd Elsmore skate park started in June 2025 and will continue through to 2026/2027. Upgrades to sports fields, lighting, and turf are also underway and will extend into 2026/2027.
